Introducing your new Curate...



Hello! My name is Claire Honess, and it is a privilege and a joy to be your new curate. I was ordained on Saturday 3rd July in Ripon Cathedral and officially started work in Barnoldswick and Bracewell the very next day.

Let me tell you a little bit about myself. I was born and brought up in West Cornwall, where my parents still live, but have been moving steadily northwards since the age of 18. I studied Italian and French at

the University of Reading and went on to do a PhD in Italian Literature (also in Reading), before working as a Lecturer in Reading, London and, for the last 18 years, Leeds.

I am married to Richard, who has recently retired, and we have two daughters, Madeleine, who is 21 and is studying Ancient and Medieval History in Birmingham, and Ellen, who is 19 and studying English Language and Linguistics in Leeds. We also have a rescue dog, a whippet-cross called Jimmy, and have recently purchased a little camper-van for days out and nights away in the Dales and beyond.



When not working, I like going for long walks, travelling in the UK and abroad, playing the cornet (badly) and knitting (also badly).

I was baptised as a baby and attended church with my family until I was in my late teens. Like many young people, I stopped attending church when I went to university and for many years would have described myself as a 'sympathetic agnostic'. However, I always felt that I'd go back to church someday... and that day arrived in 2010, when I was on a 5-month work trip to the USA. I went full of doubts and came away – having had a profound sense of meeting Christ in the Eucharist – with a strong sense not only of renewed faith but also of vocation.

It took me several years to put that vocation properly into words, but in July 2019 – almost two years to the day before my ordination – I was told that I had been accepted to train for ordained ministry. I have been training part-time alongside my full-time 'day job', so the last two years have been extraordinarily busy and sometimes – not least thanks to the intervention of a global pandemic – quite difficult. There have been high points too, though. In particular, I was very lucky to have the opportunity to spend three months in France last Autumn on an ecumenical placement, where I lived, studied and worked alongside a Roman Catholic religious community near Lyon.

And, through it all, nothing has blunted my sense that I am doing the right thing – that this is what God has called me to do and where God has called me to be – and my first few weeks as a curate have only served to reinforce that certainty.



I feel very lucky to be here and to have the opportunity to serve you as your curate while I continue to learn from Revd Sheena and the rest of the team. If I haven't met you yet, please do introduce yourself to me, and bear with me while I learn a lot of new names... I am looking forward to my time in Barnoldswick very much indeed.

My name is Lois Green and I am the Health and Safety representative for the Parish of Barnoldswick. We want all who enter our churches to feel safe and welcome. In order to achieve this we have a Health and Safety policy which is amended and updated as necessary.

WHAT IS HEALTH AND SAFETY?

Definition: 'Regulations and procedures intended to prevent accident or injury in work places or public environments'. It is <u>not</u> safeguarding which is 'protection of children and vulnerable adults from abuse'.

WHAT IS RISK ASSESSMENT?

Definition: 'A term used to describe the overall process or method where hazards and risk factors are identified that have the potential to cause harm'. Completing a risk assessment form is not time-consuming or an exercise in writing. It is about identifying sensible precautions.

When actions and precautions are taken, a review date is set to assess effectivity. Let's be honest, accidents are a part of everyday life. By taking sensible precautions we are minimising the risk. However, it is important for each one of us to be aware of hazards. In so doing we are protecting ourselves and others. If anyone identifies a potential for risk you must inform myself or the churchwarden. We can then initiate action.

Peter and Margaret Capstick were tenant farmers on a farm in Newchurch-in-Pendle. Margaret was a Christian and one day while working in the fields she looked up to see a light shining all over the barn. Since coming home I am at peace with everything and decisions have been made. On my last morning I was there, I walked to the highest point near the car park and looked down on the building. "See what I have provided for you" I felt the Lord was saying. Peter and Margaret's daughter, Tracy, has become the manager and prays for a short time in the mornings. I joined her and was blessed by her prayers and encouragement.

And so the work continues, founded on persistent prayer and trust in the Lord. Thank you Peter and Margaret for your obedience to God. May you be richly blessed in your retirement.

<u>Licensed Lay Ministry (Reader)</u> End of third year

If everything had been normal, that is with no Covid, then I would be Licensed as a Lay Minister this autumn.

Unfortunately, Covid has meant that I could not undertake the placement module which is part of the third-year course. And because I haven't completed this I cannot be fully licensed until next year when (hopefully) I will have completed the placement part of the course.

As most of you know, I was commissioned a few weeks ago. It was felt by Leeds School of Ministry that because we had completed most of the course, and with Covid not being our fault, we should be recognised in some way, hence the commissioning. Being commissioned means that the Bishop of Leeds has determined that I have his permission to say morning and evening prayer, and that I have his permission to preach. There was a very low-key service for this at Mirfield, but I feel proud to have the Bishop's authority to undertake these forms of ministry.

My placement will take place in January to Holy Week next year. I have asked to be placed either in Skipton or Ilkley. This will involve worshipping at a church, becoming involved in the life of the church and completing a 5000-word portfolio.

If everything goes to plan, I will be Licensed as a Lay Minister, along with my colleagues on the course, at a cathedral, by the Bishop next spring or summer.
