Caring for God's Acre is an initiative that recognises the unique contribution of churchyards and church land in supporting and sustaining wildlife in England and Wales.

As part of our care for Ghyll Churchyard, the PCC has voted to extend the grass growing season in line with conservation recommendations so that there is more opportunity for pollinators to thrive. This has been agreed by the Ghyll Gardeners and the contractor who mows for us.

What this means is that we have decided to leave the grass in the older areas in the churchyard to grow to medium length for 12-16 weeks while the grass around the new grave areas and the area for interment of ashes are kept neat.

The care of individual graves remains the responsibility of the next of kin.

We have also installed more bird and bat boxes to encourage a diversity of wildlife.

At Holy Trinity the small triangular bed at the St James end of the churchyard will be planted to encourage pollinators. The area at the back of Holy Trinity remains difficult. We wish to encourage wildlife, but the trees block light from some of our neighbours, and we are mindful of security issues if we are to remove bush from the overgrown sloping land. We plan to take advice on this from a variety of sources.
